### PASTORAL NOTES

"... [I] n fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died. For since death came through a human being, the resurrection of the dead has also come through a human being; for as all die in Adam, so all will be made alive in Christ."—1 Corinthians 15:20-22 NRSV



On March 22, I blogged about watching an amazing combination of events juxtaposed on the TV screen—President Barack Obama speaking to the people of Cuba about a future of hope and change on one side and, on the other, live pictures of the terrible tragedy in Brussels, Belgium where terrorists had just killed dozens and injured hundreds of innocent people. This morning the news is filled with descriptions of another horrific attack—this time upon innocent children and families in Pakistan where over 70 have died and hundreds more been injured. The radical extremists attacked on Easter in an attempt to target Christians celebrating the holy day.

What an outrage! Easter is the most important day for Christians—a day of rejoicing! What can we do in the face of such evil? As people of faith how do we respond to violence and hatred? What do we believe about the future? Where do we find hope?

We must look to God for our hope. This hope is grounded in an empty tomb on Easter morning. Jesus died on Good Friday and his body was laid in a newly hewn tomb. "But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power." [Acts 2:24] Even before he died Jesus claimed this victory. Jesus spoke to his disciples: "The hour is coming, indeed it has come, when you will be scattered, each one to his home, and you will leave me alone. Yet I am not alone because the Father is with me. I have said this to you, so that in me you may have peace. In the world you face persecution. But take courage; I have overcome the world!" [John 16:32-33]

Through the cross we see how God works—bringing victory out of apparent defeat. One of my favorite quotes about this is: "On the cross we see powerless love overcoming loveless power." Paul puts it this way: "So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body." [I Corinthians 15:42-44]

In their terrible attack in Pakistan yesterday, the terrorists attempted to glorify death and destroy hope. The irony is that they did this on Easter when Christ showed us that we do not have to fear death anymore! When Jesus showed us that we can, indeed, hope in him in all things. "Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory? Where, o death, is your sting? . . . Thanks be to God, who gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ." [I Corinthians 15:54c-55, 57]

Please join me in prayer for the people of Pakistan as we continue to also pray for the people of Belgium, Turkey, Iraq, Syria and all those places where innocents have suffered.
